

Time is of the essence

The 3/8 cent sales tax supporting both stadiums expires on January 31, 2031.

- 2030 would be the final season for both teams in their current homes.
- There is no funding secured past that date when the leases end.
- The average length of time from agreement to stadium opening is 4 years and 5 months.

Our teams generate brand value for the region



- Kansas City ranks #2 nationally as a sports destination. 1
 - Behind only Boston and ahead of Pittsburgh, New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, Dallas, Philadelphia, Miami and Atlanta.
- The Kansas City Chiefs team is valued at \$4.85 billion.²
- The Kansas City Royals team is valued at \$1.3 billion.²
- 80% of attendees to games at Kauffman Stadium come from within a radius of 75 miles of Downtown KC.
- MLB's 2024 season had highest attendance in 7 years.



Where we stand in Missouri

A Jackson County, MO ballot measure to extend the current sales tax to fund the stadiums failed in April 2024 with 58% voting against it.

Governor Kehoe recently signed the Show-Me Sports Investment Act to authorize a funding mechanism that would allow the state to use sales and income taxes generated at the stadium to pay for construction loans, potentially funding up to 50% of a stadium project.

Any potential opportunity in Missouri (Clay or Jackson County) would likely require an election and vote of support before state funding would kick in, though other options may be explored.

A November vote in either County would need to be filed by August 26 to go on the ballot.

Where we stand in Kansas

The Kansas Legislature would need to extend STAR Bond stadium funding if a relocation offer is not accepted by a team before June 30, 2025.

Under the 2024 plan, Kansas could finance up to 70% of stadium construction through Sales Tax and Revenue bonds, also known as STAR bonds. The bonds would be paid back by tax revenues generated from within any new stadiums and surrounding retail development, as well as future sports betting and Kansas Lottery revenues.

The Legislative Coordinating Council will need to extend the legislation after the end of this month.

In all scenarios, Missouri and Kansas, a public/private partnership will be necessary for any stadium project.
